16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

As per National Education Policy 2020, the academic Bank of Credits (ABC) has been introduced to facilitate the academic mobility of students with a freedom to study across the Higher Education Institutions in the country with an appropriate credit transfer mechanism from one program to another leading to attain a Degree/ Diploma etc., ABC shall deposit credits awarded by registered institutions into student's accounts and stores for a maximum period of 7 years. An orientation workshop was arranged to explain the students how to create an Aadhar Card based Digi Locker account . ABC IDs are created for all the students through Digi Locker. Credit transfer into students' ABC account is under process and will be done as per Andhra University notification.

17.Skill development:

The College is dedicated to helping students develop the necessary competencies for proficiency through a structured educational approach. The curriculum, designed in alignment with the guidelines of the Andhra Pradesh State Council of Higher Education (APSCHE), follows the Outcome-Based Education (OBE) framework. This framework emphasizes skill development and clear learning objectives, with courses specifically tailored to enhance discipline-specific skills. In line with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the curriculum places a strong emphasis on skill development. Courses are designed according to UGC recommendations to ensure that Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) focus on skills directly relevant to the students' major areas of study. The following Skill Development and Life Skill Courses were offered in the academic year 2023-2024: Skill Development Courses: Plant Nursery Management Insurance Promotion Business Communication Solar Energy Social Work Methods Life Skill Courses: Information and Communication Technology Human Values and Professional Ethics Environmental Education Analytical Skills In addition to these courses, students are required to complete a mandatory 2-month short-term internship and a 15-week semester internship, both of which help enhance employability and industry-readiness. The College has also partnered with the Andhra Pradesh State Skill Development Corporation (APSSDC) to establish a Skill Development Centre. This center provides training in key areas such as soft skills, analytical skills, communication skills, and computer skills. The institution has developed a system where students can engage in various hands-on skill development programs, including: Organic Farming Mushroom Farming Hydroponic Fodder Production Solar Fencing Herbal Soap Preparation Herbal Phenyl and Liquid Detergent Production Students at the college are given the opportunity to run and manage a cafeteria, which enhances their practical skills in business management, customer service, and food preparation. In this hands-on experience, they learn how to handle day-to-day operations, including managing inventory, customer interactions, and maintaining a hygienic environment, all of which are vital skills for future careers in hospitality or business. Additionally, students are trained in bakery operations within the college hostel. As part of the "Earn While You Learn" program, students bake a variety of goods and sell them to both staff and students on campus. This initiative provides students with the opportunity to practice entrepreneurial skills such as product development, pricing, marketing, and managing finances, all while earning income. Both the cafeteria and bakery operations not only equip students with valuable industryspecific skills but also cultivate a sense of responsibility and teamwork, preparing them for future career paths in business and hospitality. Social service skills are cultivated through the activities of the two NSS units and NCC, along with a two-month Community Service Project introduced after the second semester. To promote both interpersonal and intrapersonal skills, students participate in a variety of engaging activities such as seminars, field trips, role plays, group discussions, problem-solving exercises, science exhibitions, industrial visits, and more. These experiences are designed to foster collaboration, communication, and critical thinking, all essential for personal and professional growth.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Activities of the college reflecting the integration of Indian Knowledge System: The college adopted multilingual system by offering Telugu and Sanskrit as second language which impart the Indian Knowledge system (Indian culture and tradition) to the students. English is offered as first language to make the students understand the issues at global level. College library is the rich source of Indian Knowlege system. It has epics such as Ramayana, Mahabharatha, purans, vedas, some of the upanishads, many literature books etc. College celebrated festival Sankranthi in the name of 'Sankranthi Sambaralu' which reflect the culture and tradition of Telugu people. Bharatha Natyam, Kuchipudi dance performances given by the students in Annual Day and other celebrations depict Indian culture. The institution celebrated International Yoga Day on 21-06-2023 to stress the significance of yoga and meditation. The Institution Celebrated of Constitution Day, Independence Day, Republic day, Ektha Diwas etc., to enlighten the students regarding Indian History, Constitutional values etc. Human Values and Professional Ethics course was offered to inculcate value system among the students. College celebrates the days of National importance to ignite patriotic fervor among the students. An Ayruveda Hospital exists in the College Campus where staff members and students are treated by experienced Ayurveda Doctors.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome based education is a student centric teaching and learning methodology in which course delivery, assessment is planned to achieve stated objectives and outcomes. It focuses on measuring student performance i.e. outcomes at different levels. Program outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are designed and formulated by APSCHE. In college level meetings. POs, PSOs are mapped to COs Attainment of Course Outcomes is calculated through the performance of students in continuous internal assessment and semester end assessment. Program outcome attainment is calculated by taking the attainment in all courses into consideration and percentage of attainment is assessed.

20.Distance education/online education:

SPACES Degree College encourages online education to promote blended mode of teaching and learning. Faculty members engage online classes through Google meet during holidays and for taking extra classes beyond college hours. The students and faculty members are encouraged to register for MOOCS courses which are offered through Swayam platform. Teaching staff are encouraged to attend online FDP programs by giving on duty facility. Faculty members have completed 44 online FDPs offered by various institutions during 2023-2024.

The institution conducts regular staff appraisals to enhance teaching quality. Anonymous student feedback evaluates teachers' expertise, commitment, enthusiasm, class engagement, and professional interactions. Feedback, collected annually, ensures transparency and aids in continuous improvement.

The collected feedback is analyzed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), and, based on this analysis, the Principal confidentially counsels faculty members, if necessary, to address areas for improvement.

The institution employs a Performance-Based Self-Appraisal (PBSA) system alongside student feedback. Annually, teachers self-assess their development, research, and co-curricular contributions via an HR-prescribed format. These are reviewed by the Principal and sent to HR, with constructive suggestions provided. Promotions are significantly influenced by these evaluations, fostering professional growth.For non-teaching staff, the Head of the administrative section submits periodic reports to the Principal regarding the staff's efficiency, adherence to rules and regulations, and timely task completion. These reports are reviewed by the Principal, and confidential evaluations are forwarded by the Principal and Superintendent to higher authorities when considering promotions.

Finally, all feedback-pertaining to both teaching and non-teaching staff-is deliberated upon by the Staff Council. This collaborative effort ensures continuous improvement in the efficiency and effectiveness of institutional operations.

The institution has implemented efficient systems for managing both degradable and non-degradable waste, ensuring sustainability and environmental responsibility.

Biodegradable Waste Management Biodegradable waste, which can be decomposed by living organisms, is effectively managed within the campus. The primary sources include waste paper from classrooms, garden waste (such as weeds and dried leaves), and animal waste (dung and urine) from the campus dairy farm. Animal waste is directed to the biogas plant, where microorganisms break it down to produce biogas and slurry. The biogas serves as a standby power source, while the slurry is used as an organic fertilizer in the banana plantation and other seasonal fruit cultivation.

Liquid Waste Management The institution employs strategies to minimize water pollution and conserve groundwater while preventing the spread of harmful microorganisms. Liquid waste generated on campus is treated in a sewage treatment plant for partial purification, making it suitable for irrigation purposes.

Non-Biodegradable Waste Management Non-biodegradable waste is creatively recycled on campus. For instance, unused tyres are repurposed into decorative items, fostering creativity among students while reducing waste.

These comprehensive waste management practices reflect the institution's commitment to sustainability and environmental awareness.
